Informal Invitations:

SAMPLE PHRASES TO USE IN AN INFORMAL INVITATION

"Please come to our party on..."

"Would you like to come to dinner on...""

"Can you make a meeting at 3pm..."



To accept an invitation to an informal party / dinner, you can write:

"Thanks for your invitation / invite. I'd love to come."

"Thank you for inviting me to dinner. I'm looking forward to it very much."



To decline these invitations, you can write:

"Thank you for your invitation, but I'm sorry I can't come."

"I'm sorry, but I'm not going to be able to make it on..."

Accepting invitations:

- Thank you. Yes, that would be very nice.
- Yes, let's do that.
- That sounds like fun.
- Thank you very much.
- · That would be nice.
- · Certainly, I'd love to ...
- Sure, that would be great!

Refusing invitations:

- Thank you. I'm afraid I have another engagement.
- · Sorry, I'm afraid I can't.
- I am sorry. I have other plans.
- I'd really like to, but I have an appointment that day.
- . That's very kind of you, but I can't.

Hesitating:

- This is great! I'll let you know tonight if I can come.
- Thanks. I will ask my parents.
- I might be busy. I'll let you know later.
- I'm not sure what my plans are. Could I get back to you tomorrow?
- Thank you, but I'll check my calendar. Do you mind if I tell you tomorrow?

Examples:

Person 1: Would you like to go to the cinema?

Person 2: Yes. That sounds great.

Person 1: I was wondering if you like to attend my sister's wedding tonight.

Person 2: That's very kind of you, but I should take care of my sick mother.
